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SOUNDEX

The SOUNDEX index uses the sound, just as the name implies, rather than the spelling of the name. It enables you to find the family you are seeking more easily. However, for the 1880 Federal Census only, it is limited to families with a child of 10 years of age or younger, so therefore, does not include all families. The SOUNDEX is available at the Wisconsin State Historical Society Library in the microforms room for six states for the 1880 Federal Census on the following: California, 34 reels; Illinois, 143 reels; Iowa, 75 reels; Minnesota, 37 reels; Wisconsin, 51 reels. --extracted from *Lafayette Co. 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ADD ROUTES TO YOUR ROOTS

All roads lead to home. Try tracing those roads for each person in your family to create an unusual visual version of your family's history. Such a representation of where each member has been can provide a fascinating new way to help understand the value of your "routes."

The suggestions presented here are designed as idea generators for creating your own *geographic* history. Try the map or other versions. Try them all! Draw your history as simply or elaborately as you choose. Enjoy the richness of your routes.

A family history map:

1. Trace a map that includes all the places each person in your immediate (or extended) family has lived. Use a local map if you've moved only a few blocks or a global map if you've been a world traveler.

2. Choose a color to represent each member of your family.

3. Place a colored dot in each location a family member has lived. Vary the size of the dot depending on how long a member resided in that location. For example, if Dad lives in Boston for 10 years, his *blue* dot there would be larger than Mom's *red* dot in Topeka which shows that as a child she spent three years in that city.

4. Choose a new color to indicate change in marital status. (Mom and Dad's dots blended to purple when they married and moved to New Orleans.)

5. Add additional colors as children arrive.

6. Draw arrows from one spot to the next, indicating the direction of movement over time, and add dates for a time line effect.

7. Make a color key for each person included on the map, or have people guess what color represents which family member.

8. Complete the map and give it as a gift or display it in your home to remind you of how far you've come.

Variations:

A. If your family's geographic history is complex, you might try "layering" different time periods by superimposing one map over another. Use layers of tissue paper or pieces of clear acetate with different stages drawn on each one.

B. Use a different overlay for each person. See how paths crisscross and overlap.

C. If you don't wish to sketch your geographic history on a map, try charting each member's geographic dots on a page or as bars on a histogram.

D. Locate photos from a family album to represent each stage in a family member's geographic history and "plot" them on a large sheet of paper or use them in a multiple-photo frame.--from *Correspondent*, *AAL's member magazine*, Aid Association for Lutherans, Appleton, WI, Spring 1989, pp. 13-14. 6. Especially for a genealogist, consider giving a genealogy resource book, such as a guide to research in a particular state, or the holdings of a particular collection that could be helpful in their search.

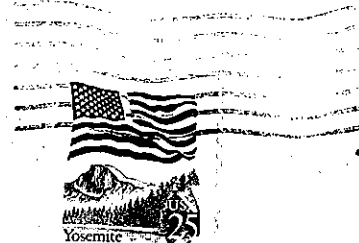
