MARSHFIELD NEWSPAPERS

The history of Marshfield Newspapers is one marked with competition and mergers. The earliest record of a Marshfield newspaper is the Marshfield Times, established in 1879. This chronology only applies to the papers printed in English. There was also a newspaper that was printed in German. The German newspaper, entitled the "Wochenblatt" existed for approximately 35 years. The "Wochenblatt" is not chronicled below or owned by the Marshfield Public Library.

- 1879 Marshfield Times established
- 1882 Marshfield Gazette established
- 1883 <u>Marshfield Gazette and Times merge</u> and adopt the name <u>Marshfield Times</u>
- 1889 New newspaper entitled Marshfield News
- 1911 Another newspaper entitled <u>Marshfield</u>
 Herald established
- 1920 <u>Marshfield Times</u> sold and name changes to Marshfield Hub
- 1921 <u>Marshfield Hub</u> and <u>Marshfield News</u> merge to become Marshfield's first daily newspa-
- per per. Previous to this all were weeklies. This newly formed paper was named <u>Marshfield</u> Daily News.
- 1927 The weekly paper, <u>Marshfield Herald</u>, merges with the daily, <u>Marshfield Daily</u> <u>News</u>. From this merger came the daily, <u>Marshfield News Herald</u>.

1920 FEDERAL CENSUS SEARCH

Martin W. Johnson, of Belvidere, IL writes:

I have been searching the 1920 Federal censuses of various counties in Illinois, Minnesota, and Wisconsin. In the process, I have observed that many of the townships and city wards note the German province of birth, and in some cases give the city or county. At times, some of these locations are crossed out and are too hard-to-read, but if the zoom lens is used - they become readable. There are some provinces listed for parents if their children were born in the U.S. If parents were deceased, this information was given to the census taker by their children. Some townships and wards have many such entries while others offer few. Several towns did not provide any foreign provinces of birth.

The immigration year and time of naturalization is recorded. The Wisconsin naturalizations prior to 1905 give the person's age, month and year of immigration along with the port of entry. After 1906, the naturalizations contain the town's name, ships name port and the date of departure and arrival in the U.S.

MILWAUKEE COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Located at 910 N. Old World 3rd Street in downtown Milwaukee, The Milwaukee County Historical Society has a wide variety of resources on the history of Milwaukee, Milwaukee County and the wider metropolitan area and state. All materials are for reference only and do not circulate. All public records are for Milwaukee County only. Especially valuable for genealogists are the large collection of Naturalization Papers, dating from 1836 - 1941, containing Final Petitions and Declarations of Intent. As Milwaukee was a major center for immigration into the state, many people who left for outlying areas filed their initial petitions there. Other resources include: City and County directories, Obituaries and Biographies, Census Records, Court Records 1837-1931, Jail Registers Probate Files, Coroner's Inquests, Civil War Records of Wisconsin Veterans, School Census Records, Maps, Photographs and Manuscripts, Church Records and much more. There is a \$5.00 fee for mail requests for genealogical and historical research. Census research is \$10.00 and may take several weeks to process. Library hours are Monday through Friday, 9:30 a.m. to noon, and 1:00 to 4:30 p.m. Call for available Saturday hours. A \$1 per day users fee is charged for non-members of the Milwaukee County Historical Society. phone (414) 273-8288.



An excellent refe Srence for planning a Research trip is <u>Searching on Location</u>, by Anne Ross Balhuizen.

(published by Ancestry, 1992). It is a small paperback 102pp, filled with very practical tips on preparing to visti libraries, archives, churches, courthouses, cemeteries and funeral homes. There is a chapter on using newspapers and other unusual resources. She makes a very convincing case for spending time before you leave home; planning on what you want to look for, doing some preliminary groundwork, and has a handy checklist of reminders for each chapter in the book.

She has some excellent tips on developing relationships and contacts with clerks and librarians - how to ask the right questions that will lead you to the information you need.
