NOTES FROM CENTRAL WISCONSIN COMPUTER INTEREST GROUP

The Central Wisconsin Computer Genealogy Group met April 29th for its Spring meeting at the Area Research Center in Stevens Point.

Rob Nurre, a consultant doing work for the State of Wisconsin in this area, made a presentation on real estate patents. He explained land measures and commented that land sold for \$1.25 and acre in 1839.

Bill Fulcer, a computer specialist with the U.S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management from the Milwaukee District Office, demonstrated the CD-ROM of land patents. Patentees can be located by name or a description of the land.

Certified copies of a one page document is \$1.50 and an uncertified copy is \$1.25.

Bill Fulcer presented Martha Walters, president of CWCGG with a copy of the CD-ROM which is available for use by members. The Area Research Center in Stevens Point also has a copy of the CD-ROM which can be used during the hours the library is open.

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FINDING WOMEN'S GRAVES

When looking for women, check the records under the married name and the maiden name. Women were buried under their maiden names from time to time. It is also important to remember that she may have remarried if her husband died previously.

When a man and a woman are buried side by side with only one stone, don't assume that they are husband and wife. This assumption will be true most of the time but it is not uncommon for a brother and sister to be buried together. It is always better to wait for positive proof than to make your genealogy inaccurate by including such assumptions as actual fact.

OLD HANDWRITING AND SYMBOLS

Reading old handwriting can be a real problem when it's in a foreign language, but it can be just as much a problem in English, especially if you're not aware of changes in handwriting and styles over the years.

Many words, for instance, were abbreviated by deleting a letter or all but the first and last letters of a word; even names were shortened this way. In Colonial America this deletion was common in letters and documents and was usually indicated by a horizontal line written above or through the word. Some of your handwriting problems may require you to find some old penmanship manuals in the library (interesting browsing, actually, whether you need them or not), but here are examples of a few of the more common abbreviations and symbols.

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NEW GERMAN ACQUISITIONS AT SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH

Half a million German pedigrees, mostly dating from 1650-1850, are now available on microfilm at the Family History Library, 35 North West Temple Street, Salt Lake City, Utah. They are also usually available at Family History Centers all over the United States. Many pedigrees are hundreds of pages long. The collection, titled *Die Ahnenstammkartei des deutschen Volkes* (The German Pedigree Card Index), includes 638 index films (listed under Family History Library Catalog computer number 688651). This is a handwritten, phonetic index. It is on 2.7 million cards and arranged by the wife's married name. It also includes over 600 pedigree films (listed under Family History Library Catalog computer number 677728).

A detailed introduction to the collection, written in German, appears on microfilm number 1,799,712, item 3. The Family History Library Catalog contains a briefer explanation in English.

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OHIO BIRTH AND DEATH RECORDS

Birth and death records were not recorded by law in Ohio until 1867. Although some records from a few counties predate 1967, records of birth and deaths in Ohio are not generally available before this date. Between 1867 and 1908, the records were kept by the probate court of each county. Microfilm of the state-wide death records for the period from December 20, 1908 through 1936 is accessed through the Ohio Historical Society. State-wide birth records from 1908 to the present, and state-wide death records from 1937 to the present are maintained by the Division of Vital Statistics, Ohio Department of Health.

The probate court records of birth may contain the child's full name, date and place of birth, sex, color, and parent names. Probate records of deaths may contain the name of the deceased, place of birth, age, and occupation, the date and place of death, cause of death, and place of residence.

HOW TO FIND YOUR IMMIGRANT ANCESTOR'S SHIP

You must know your ancestor's:

- Full, real name,
- Approximate age at arrival, and
- Approximate date of arrival.

1565 - 1819

If your ancestor arrived between 1565 and 1819, the passenger list if it still exists, might be in any archive, museum, courthouse, basement, or attic. But many have been published. Search the library in indexes to published lists.

Indexes to Published Lists

If you know the name of ancestor's ship, search for that ship in indexes compiled by ship name.

OR

If you do not know the ship, search for your ancestor in indexes compiled by passenger name.

OR

If you know your ancestor's nationality, search in indexes compiled by nationality.

OR

If you do not know the nationality, search in indexes compiled by a particular group (such as indentured servants or Irish Potato Famine Immigrants or by geographic settlement or port of entry).

OR

If your ancestor was a slave, he or she was not listed by name in the cargo manifest.

Circumstantial evidence of your ancestor's ship can be obtained, however, if you know where, when, and by whom the slave was first purchased. The search:

*In the National Archives, manifests of ships importing slaves into the ports of Savannah, Mobile, and New Orleans, 1789-1808.

*In museums, special collections containing manifests of slave ships.

*In libraries, published compilations of documents relating to the slave trade in America.

The Passenger List

When you find your ancestor's name or the ship's name in the index, use the reference cited to locate the published or microfilmed list. Then read the list line by line to find the name. Double check what you find against the ancestor's real name, approximate age at arrival, and approximate date of arrival, to be certain you have your ancestor.

Where can you find this information:

- *Oral family tradition,
- *Family documents: passports, letters, bible inscriptions, etc.,
- *Civil and religious records: Military service, naturalizations, U.S. censuses, marriages, burials, etc.,
- *Published genealogies and local histories.

1820 - 1954

If your ancestor arrived between 1820 and 1954, a microfilm copy of the list is probably at the National Archives. Search in the indexes.

National Archives Indexes

These are compiled by port for U.S. ports on the Atlantic, Pacific, Great Lakes, and Gulf Coast, but they do not cover every year or every port.

*If you know your ancestor's port of entry, search the index to passenger arrivals for that port.

*If your ancestor arrived in New York, 1847-1896, search the registers of vessel arrivals, note which ships arrived when your ancestor did, then search those lists,

*If you do not know the port of entry, search all available indexes to passenger arrivals.

*National Archives staff will search the indexes if you supply a passenger's name, port of entry, and month and year of arrival. Must use the proper form.

OR - Published Indexes

These are limited in years covered and specialized in passengers included, but they often complement National Archives indexes.

*Search indexes compiled by nationality or port of entry.

OR - The Morton-Allan Directory

This book lists the arrival date for every steamship entering New York, 1890-1930, and Boston, Baltimore, and Philadelphia, 1904-1926, from Europe.

*If you know the name of your ancestor's ship, note every date when that ship arrived, then search those lists.

*If you know the date when your ancestor arrived, note which ships arrived on that date, then search those lists.

OR - The Hamburg Emigration Index

If your ancestor emigrated from eastern, northern or central Europe, he or she may have embarked from Hamburg, Germany. Emigration lists at Hamburg are indexed, 1850-1934. Search microfilm copy of the index at any branch of the LDS Family History Library.

Marathon County and Town Histories

Laurel Hoffmann, librarian of Marathon County Genealogical Society, has furnished the following list of published histories of Marathon County and its communities that are in the Society's collection. A number of these have been indexed by members of the Society and are thus doubly useful to researchers. Laurel suggests that our members may know of other works that would be useful additions to the library. Assistance in locating and acquiring these would be great benefit to users of our library.
