### ADOPTION RECORDS

Adoption records did not become confidential until 8 July 1941 when Acts 1941, Chapter 146, Section 6, became effective. Legistlation pertaining to adoptions that had been enacted prior to 1941 focused on the issue of providing legal proff of heirship so that the adopted child became an heir at law of the adoptive parents. The intent of the pre-1941 legistlation was to make the adoption a public matter. All adoptions prior to 1941 were recorded in the civic or probate order book which were (and are) public records.

Records pertaining to adoptions after 8 July 1941 are confidential: all court orders, judgments, case files, etc. pertaining to post-1941 adoptions are to remain confidential.

### TOPOGRAPHIC MAPS OF NORWAY

The Vesterheim Genealogical Center has had increased inquiries about locating the family farm in Norway. Many have asked for maps showing farms and churches. The Center is now offering detailed topographic maps showing farms, cemetaries and churches in Norway. There are well over 700 maps for the entire country. Each map is approximately 11 miles by 15 miles; scale of 1:50,000. A church parish may be covered by one or more maps.

The Center presently has maps for the southern half of Norway. The northern half is on order and is expected shortly. The cost is \$8.00 per map, plus \$.75 shipping and handling. A ten percent discount is offered to Vesterheim members who supply us their member number. The total cost would then be \$7.95 each.

### EARLY CHICAGO CEMETARY

A recent discovery in Chicago brought to light 600 documents naming 4,000 persons who purchased burial plots in Chicago's earliest known municipal cemetery. Entries of deaths and burials, month by month, reveal names, ages, birthplaces, residence and causes of death. ### IS YOUR ANCESTOR FROM PRUSSIA?

To properly direct any genealogical inquiries, you must know more about the country from which your ancestor came from. For instance, telling someone that your ancestor came from Prussia, is like saying that he settled east of the Mississippi River in the 19th century.

Prussia is a name that has been applied to almost three-fifths of the German Empire, at one time or another, included in the large mass on the southeast coast of the Baltic Sea. From 1701, the Kingdom was ruled by the Hohenzollerns, with Berlin as the capitol. Areas which at one time or another were under the control of Prussia, include the following: Brandenburg, Posen, Silesia, Electoral, Hesse, Hesse-Nassau, Pomerania, Saxony, Thuringia, Schleswig-Holstein, Westphalia, parts of Poland, parts of Rhineland, Mecklenburg, the Dutchies of Wenden and Crossen, Engern and Geldern, Magdeburg, Cleve and Juelich, Burg and Stettin. ### WILLS

Prior to 1876, a will in Virginia did not have to name the wife or eldest son. Their inheritance of real estate was set in law, the widow receiving her one-third dower, the oldest son receiving the remaining twothirds, unless otherwise specified in the father's will. The eldest son, also received his mother's share when she died. If the eldest son had died, the heirat-law became the oldest grandson of the whole blood not the second son. If a man was unmarried, his heir-at-law was his eldest brother, never his father or uncle. In New England, the eldest son did receive a double portion of the estate, but definitely not as much as in Virginia. That was called his birthright. Each state now has laws which may differ from the early days of our country, but the early laws relied to a great degree on English common law.

### ABOUT OUR MAIN SPEAKER

WILLIAM H. SCHOEFFLER is founding chairman and current President of the New England Regional Genealogical Conference, an event sponsored by 26 genealogical societies, and next planned for Burlington. Vermont in October 1995. A nationally recognized speaker and genealogical teacher, he served as Director of Education for seven years at the New England Historic Genealogical Society, and has been an ardent genealogist since 1973.

A graduate of Johns Hopkins University and the Boston University School of Law, he also attended the National Institute on Genealogical Research at the National Archives in Washington, D.C. Mr. Schoeffler is a former president of the Association of Professional Genealogies and has served on the Board of Directors of the Federation of Genealogical Societies. He has lectured in many states across the U.S., including every one of the Old Northwest Territorics.

One quarter German-American, Mr. Schoelber's German intuigrant ancestors settled in Atton. Illinois by 1870, and he has traced some of those lines back into the 1600's. A native of New York City, he was raised in Evansion, Illinois and has also traced his ancestry to Colonial New England, Colonial Virginia, California, Mississippi, and Ireland. His articles have appeared in The American Genealogist.
