One source that should be checked is the Record of the Lying in Hospitals and Baby Forms, recorded by the Milwaukee, Wisconsin Health Department. The records have been deposited with the Milwaukee Public Library located at 814 W. Wisconsin Ave. (Park in the lot next to the library-arrive before 10:00 a.m. and the fee is only \$3.00 all day.)

Volume 1 Records include a list of births and boarding houses with child's name. sex, full name of both parents, date of birth, admission, from whom child was received, date of removal, and place moved to. For a quick look for names check the alphabetical transcript found in the Humanities Room of the Library.

## SCOTLAND INDEX ONLINE

The General Register Office for Scotland has an index online of one of the world's largest databases... of genealogical information, including over 30 million names which covers birth/baptisms and banns/marriages and deaths from the Old Parish Registers dating from 1553 to 1854. marriages and deaths from the Statutory Index for 1855-1897. And index to census for 1891 will also be provided. The 1881 census will be available later this year. The service is not free. For \$10.00 you will be able to see and download 30 computer screens of index pages and for \$16.00 you can highlight a particular record and send an electronic order for it using a credit card. You might just take a look at the web site. Keep in mind that the Old Parish Register Records are also available through the LDS Family History Centers.

## PERiodical Source Index (PERSI) By Alan E. Mann

The following information is excerpted from an internet article called Computer Genealogist - New Technology for Genealogy

A newly released CD-ROM and internet search site have greatly increased the usefulness of a major tool in genealogical research. For many years, an index to periodical articles has been published by the Allen County Public Library (of Fort Wayne, IN). To use these indexes, roots seekers had to visit a library which had the collection of volumes (published annually), and search separate volumes of indexes to find articles published about families or localities which they were researching. The new CD-ROM and Internet site make the entire collection of volumes available in the home and allow researchers to search all volumes with a single search.

#### What is PERSI?

An acronym for the PERiodical Source Index, which is an index to articles published in most genealogy and local history periodicals written in English (and some French-Canadian) since 1800. The purpose of the index is to help researchers find articles about their family or which may help further their research....How can you know if an article has been published on your family? PERSI is the tool to answer that question.

#### What does PERSI contain?

Each PERSI entry give the title of the article, name of the periodical, volume and issue number in which the article appeared, the date it was published, and a PERSI reference code. The code refers to an appendix, which gives information on the periodical, including general topic and area, title changes, frequency of publication, publisher name and address, current subscription price (if still published), list of major libraries that have the periodical in their collection and other bibliographic info.

PERSI does not contain the actual article. Once you know when and where the article appeared, you can visit a library to read the actual article. If your local library does not have the magazine,

you can order a copy from Allen County Public Library (for a reasonable fee) or request it by Inter-Library loan from a local public library.

Topics of articles include bible records, probates, family histories, farms or estates, obituaries, Revolutionary War soldiers, and nearly all types of records in the U.S. The electronic versions of PERSI allow you to search in five different ways—by name, U.S. locality, Canadian locality, International locality, or methodology type.

PERSI's search process is FOLIO-based (a local indexing company), which allows you to search for any word in the title of any article and combine search terms. Results appear in a summary format that helps you know how many times each search word appears in PERSI, and how many times two or more of the requested words are found in the same article.

A single CD-ROM contains the whole index. When you find an article, you click on the PERSI code and it displays the full bibliographic information about the periodical, including a list of a few libraries that have it available. The suggested retain price is \$99.95 and is available from the publisher, Ancestry, Inc. (801-426-3500)

PERSI can be accessed over the Internet at Ancestry'w Web site using <a href="https://www.ancestry.com">www.ancestry.com</a>. Ancestry offers full access to PERSI only upon subscription to the Ancestry Internet Library, which costs \$4.95 per month. You also get access to over 200 genealogy data bases.


