"A LETTER TO MY DAUGHTER, 11 SEPTEMBER 2001," by Juliana Smith

Last night after I tucked my daughter in, my original plan was to write an article for this week. But as I scanned the list of ideas that I keep in the date book on my desk, I couldn't make myself focus on any of them. My mind just wasn't quite ready to get back to the usual genealogical articles that you are used to seeing from me.

As I write this, only a week has passed since we witnessed the horrible devastation in New York, Washington, and Pennsylvania. I wonder if life will ever be the same, and I fear the answer. In some ways, it seems as though it has been a long time since this senseless act. I have been to a conference in Iowa and am back. I have put together several newsletters since and our day-to-day routine is once again in place. Yet, the memory of that fateful day is still as clear and vivid as if it was this morning, and for far too many families whose lives have been changed dramatically by these events, life will truly never be the same.

So last night, I put away my notebook and thoughts of this article, and with my laptop, I curled up in a chair. I've run many tips from readers in the newsletter and even penned a few articles myself, about the importance of documenting the present so that there will be a record to be passed on to future generations. While I do keep a journal that I write in occasionally (granted not as often as I should), and I try to keep up with records in my daughter's baby book, as far as I can remember, most of what I have recorded is centered exclusively around our family and family events. But this was to be different. I began a letter to my daughter.

SOCIAL SECURITY FEE INCREASES

As of July 1, 2001, the Social Security

Administration is increasing the fees charged for providing some records and services that are not related to the Social Security program. Since the last increase in fees for these records and services was in 1988, some of the increases are substantial.

These services and fees are the following:

Request for copy of Original Application for Social Security Card (Form SS-5). Social Security Number Provided – \$27.

Request for copy of Original Application for Social Security Card (Form SS-5). Social Security Number Not Provided – \$29.

Request for Computer Extract of Social Security Number Application, Social Security Number Provided (Numident only requested) - \$16.

Request for Computer Extract of Social Security Number Application, Social Security Number Not Provided (Numident only requested) - \$18.

Search for information about Death of an individual, Social Security Number Provided – \$16.

Search of information about Death of an individual, Social Security Number Not Provided – \$18.

Telephone Scam

Individuals are calling people on the phone and identifying themselves as an AT&T Service technician who are conducting a test on telephone lines. They state that to complete the test you should touch nine (9), zero (0), the pound sign (#), and then hang up. If you push 90#, you give the requesting individual full access to your telephone line, which enables them to place long distance calls and bill them to your home phone number.

Upon investigation, it has been found out that this scam has been originating from many local jails/ prisons. Telecom, Pacific Bell, MCI, Bell Atlantic, Verizon and GTE have all verified this information. Please beware. DO NOT press 90# for ANYONE.

Computer Virus Attacks Genealogists

DO NOT OPEN "NEW PICTURES OF FAMILY". It is a virus that will erase your whole "C" drive. It will come to you in the form of an E-Mail from a familiar person. Forward this to everyone in your address book.

Intel announced that a new and very destructive virus was discovered recently. If you receive an email called "FAMILY PICTURES," do not open it. Delete it right away! This virus removes all dynamic link libraries (*.dll files*) from your computer. Your computer will not be able to boot. (from an E-Mail alert via the Internet.)

Fraudulent Genealogy Site

This site and its operators are fraudulently collecting e-mail addresses! They try to bait researchers with the "One Billion Names" statement. As soon as you enter their web site, a cookie and directory entry are placed on your computer's hard drive. You cannot access any of their purported databases. They have hit California, Washington, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and New York.

It was difficult to find the words at first, so I started out by just relating the commonplace events of that day and those preceding --- what we had done over the weekend, what was going on in o u r household, and so on as they led into the events of that morning. As I began writing about the images that flashed in my mind, the emotions began to show through in a big way.

I began writing more and more about my reaction, rather than just the facts, and there was this snowball effect. I realized I was beginning to reveal more and more of myself on the pages. My love and fears for family members-both in New York and here at home, and my hopes for my daughter's future were included. I talked about how I had often gotten a little teary-eyed when I heard our National Anthem, but now I cry every t i m e I h e a r i t.

I typically watch the news several times a day, but now find myself checking news sites online more often than usual to make sure that more violence hasn't occurred or that there hasn't been some other tragedy. I want to do everything I can for the many heroes that have emerged in this crisis. The firemen, police, and office workers who gave their lives to try to save others, the many volunteers who work still to sift through the rubble, the passengers who fought back and saved lives at the cost of their own, the families of the victims, and all of the American people who have given money, supplies, and prayers to all of those who so desperately need them.

Our flag is waving in front of the house now and I talked about the sense of pride I feel every time I look at it and the others that fly up and down our block. My political tendencies are there on paper as I discuss the fact that partisan politics seem to have disappeared into the background as our country has united against this common enemy.

What began as a simple letter to my daughter so that years down the road, she would understand what happened, has in some ways turned into a snapshot of me in the world we now live in. Sure there's more to the story than what is included in those pages, but it tells far more than I have learned of most of my ancestors.

They too lived through wars, famine, flood, fire, and other disasters. There were good times and bad -- just as we have lived through good times and bad. While I can look in a history book for some important date in history and plot that date in my ancestors' lives on a chart, without a preserved journal, letter, or other personal record of that event, chances are I will never be able to know exactly what they were feeling at that time. What were their thoughts about the future? Their fears? Did they cry when they heard "The Star-Spangled Banner" or "The Battle Hymn of the Republic?" Who were their heroes? I'll probably never know. But when my descendants learn about 11 September 2001 in their history class or books, maybe, just maybe, they will have read a letter written by one of their ancestors to her daughter that will make this more than just a date in a history book. Will your descendants have one, too?

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NORTH WOOD COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY
