# WISCONSIN NAME INDEX

The Wisconsin Historical Society has announced its Wisconsin Name Index, a new On-line tool to help genealogists research their Wisconsin ancestors.

The Wisconsin Name Index leads to more than 100,000 obituaries, personal sketches, and other short biographies of Wisconsin people. These texts originally appeared in 150 county and local histories, dozens of professional directories and biographical encyclopedias, more than 60 scrapbooks containing 30,000 obituaries, and in Wisconsin magazines and newspapers. Thousands include portraits and other illustrations. Users can search the database with a last name, first name, maiden name, time frame, and various other details. Photocopies of biographical sketches, articles, and obituaries can all be ordered on-line through our on-line genealogical research service.

The name index was created not by amateurs but by professional librarians at the State Historical Society. Starting about 1870, staff members made a catalog card for every biographical sketch in each new Wisconsin history. They made a similar card for every obituary added to the scrapbooks the called "Wisconsin Necrology," and frequently added cards for magazines and newspaper articles about Wisconsin residents. After more than a century of such work, the data on the original cards was typed into a database and the Wisconsin Name Index was born.

**National Archive's Access** to the Archives Databases at <www.archives.gov/add> "Now, people can pull these electronic records at their own convenience," said Michael Carlson, electronic and special media records director for the archives/. "It's totally self-service from you desktop." The records available on the database system represent a small fraction of the archive's electronic holdings...mostly deal with information that easily can be looked based on specific name, dates, organizations, cities or states. 1906 Canadian Census is available at last— The Canadian government has just agreed after a 5-year court battle to release the 1906 Census of Canada. This is a major breakthrough for genealogists as these records and all records subsequent to these had been sealed and were to be sealed forever. Subsequent to the announcement of Ministers Rock and Copps regarding the immediate release of the 1906 Census of the Western Provinces, Ian Wilson, National Archivist has announced that hose records are now assessable on-line. # **Summer Genealogy Trips:** Let's go find the Ancestors

Before you leave on that trip to find the relatives, prepare, prepare, prepare.

- Call all of the offices, libraries, historical societies, cemeteries, and relatives that you plan to visit. Do not assume that last years hours will be the same for this year.
- Do they have any type of handout that you could receive by mail or is there a web site you can review?
- Organize your material, don't expect that a staff person should watch you sort through your briefcase for that one piece of paper that you know is there somewhere.
- Bring your information with you. That pedigree isn't going to do you any good on the desk or on your computer at home, if you have left your information in the car, go back and get it. However, a descendency chart has more information than you need. You are looking for you ancestors in most cases, not your second cousins children. If you forgot your information at home, ask the staff person if they have a blank pedigree form and fill it out, having a staff member fill it out for you is not a wise use of time. They are your relatives, you know them best.
- What type of copying facilities are there? Coin operated, debit card, do they make change in the building. What is the largest bill that change will be made for?
- Lunch hours: does the office or department close, for how long?
- Parking: availability, time limits, costs, ramp nearby? Map?
- May I bring in my lap top computer, may I use a camera?

If a society has a web page, you'll find info on its holdings. Many sites offer you a chance to submit a research request online for a fee. 
