How to Easily Add Genealogy Books to Your Personal Genealogy Library

One of the easiest ways to add old genealogy books to your personal library is to download them from Google Books, Archive.org, or any of the other electronic repositories of old genealogy books. Then save them onto your computer's hard drive. The process is simple and the books are available free of charge. Best of all, you don't have to purchase bookcases or build an addition onto your house just for books.

For instance, when I started researching my family tree more than thirty

years ago, I purchased a reprint of a genealogy book first published in 1920: The Harmon Genealogy, comprising all branches in New England written by Artemas C. Harmon. The book mentions my greatgrandmother, Lucy Harmon, and documents her Harmon ancestry back to 1667. It is a won-

derful resource, and I have referred to this book often over the years.

I paid more than \$100 for this reprinted book many years ago. Today, the same book is available online. The cost is **ZERO**. I can download the entire book to my hard drive or to a jump drive or save it to an online storage service. I can print one page, multiple pages, or even the entire book. Even better, I can electronically search the entire book within seconds for any word or phrase. Not only can I search for names, but I can also search for towns, dates, occupations, or any other words of interest. Try doing that with a printed book!

If you have sufficient room, you can save books onto your computer's hard drive. Then again, you may prefer to save genealogy books onto an external hard drive, onto CD-ROM disks, in flash drives, in the cloud, or anyplace else that is easy and convenient. You can do whatever you want, although I will **NEV**-

ER print an entire book. I don't have that much storage space available!

I had a few books already saved on my computer but in the past few days I have decided to increase my collection significantly. I have now downloaded and saved more than 100 old genealogy and history books to my hard drive. You can easily do the same.

First, search for the book(s) you want. Search for surnames, county histories, military units, or anything else you can think of. I'd suggest first searching by using Google.com's search engine. If that doesn't quickly find any books of interest, visit the individual online electronic libraries at Archive.org, Google Books, the Allen County (Indiana) Public Library (those books are also available at Archive.org), Brigham Young University Harold B. Lee Library, Brigham Young University Hawaii Joseph F. Smith Library, Family History Library, Houston Public Library's Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research, the Mid-Continent Public Library's Midwest Genealogy Center, and others.

Another great place to search for ebooks is at Mollie Lynch's "Genealogy Book Links" at http://genealogybooklinks.com/. Her list includes many smaller digital collections that you otherwise might never think of.

Use the search box at each site. If unsuccessful, using the Advanced Search available on many sites will usually result in "hits" that are closer to your exact area (s) of interest. Once a book of interest is found, you can find a download link. Some sites, such as Archive.org, may offer downloads in multiple formats. If unsure which format to use, select PDF. If you have an ebook reader (Kindle, Nook, iPad, Android), you might prefer a different format.

Once downloaded, place the book in whatever location you prefer. I normally place my genealogy ebooks in /Dropbox/genealogy/ebooks/ but you might prefer some other location.

One caveat: some of the online sites provide PDF files that can be searched for any word or phrase even after being stored on your own hard drive. Other online sites may not provide PDF files with search capabilities. I usually start at http://www.Archive.org simply because the books I find there usually can be searched for words or phrases even when stored on my own disk drive. Books downloaded in PDF format

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from Google Books normally are not searchable. Other online ebook sites vary widely. I suggest FIRST searching for books on Archive.org but, if not found there, expand your search. A non-searchable book is still better than no book at all.

Of course, it might seem silly to download books onto your own hard drive when the same books are also always available online in any of the digital libraries. The argument might be, "Why duplicate efforts when you can download the book at any time in the future, whenever you want?" Indeed, there is some truth to that argument. However, I have two answers:

- I. Things change frequently on the Internet. Just because it is available today doesn't mean it will still be available in the future when I have a need.
- 2. I find it faster and easier to search ebooks stored on my computer's own hard drive than to download books over an Internet connection. That is especially true when using a laptop computer in the third subbasement of the archives at some government building where a wi-fi Internet connection is not available. I like the security of having my own copy available whenever I want it. Of course, the online site makes for a great backup copy!

All in all, building a library of old books is now much easier and far cheaper than ever before. OK, now go build your personal library!

Censuses of Canada West and Canada East, 1842 Now Available Online

Library and Archives Canada




Library and Archives Canada has announced that Canadians can now access the Census of Canada West, 1842 as well as the Census of Canada East, 1842 online. In 1841, Upper Canada was renamed Canada West, whereas Lower Canada became Canada East. These two jurisdictions are now known as the provinces of Ontario and Quebec.

Each census contains the names of heads of family, their occupation and the number of residents for each family. Users can search these new databases by the names of heads of family, as well as by geographical information such as district and sub-district names.

Genealogy Roadshow on PBS

While the genealogy news of the past few weeks has revolved around this year's production of Who Do You Think You Are?, we should remember it is not the only genealogy television program in the United States. Genealogy Roadshow is in production now and will appear on PBS later this year. The program uses a team of professional genealogists to prove or disprove claims that various people have been told about their ancestors. In some cases, the pros will be tracing family lines back hundreds of years in the process.



Genealogy Roadshow is structurally similar to Antiques Roadshow and is modeled after an Irish TV program of the same name which is in its second season in Ireland on RTE Television. San Francisco residents already mentioned as being featured in various episodes include Jamie O'Keefe, Cecilia Chen, and Lisa Gates. I think the investigation of Cecilia Chen's ancestry should be particularly interesting for those of us who have not researched Chinese ancestry.

The program will feature genealogical authors, lecturers and researchers Joshua Taylor and Kenyatta Berry as the show's on-air experts. Los Angeles-area broadcaster Emmett Miller has been named as the host of the series.

The Genealogy Roadshow on PBS will be broadcast September 23 through October 14, 2013.

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Have You Tried These Websites?

LINEAGE

Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) http://services.dar.org/public/dar research/search/?

The online Genealogical Research System is a must-see for anyone considering NSDAR membership or trying to ascertain if a family member was a Revolutionary War veteran. The database contains the names of Revolutionary War Patriots whose service and identity have been established by the NSDAR. Included is information on the dates and places of birth and death, names of spouses, residence during the Revolution, rank and type of service, and the state where the patriot served.

EMIGRATION/NATURALIZATION Ellis Island

http://www.ellisisland.org/

From 1892 to 1954, more than 12 million immigrants entered the US through the portal of Ellis Island, a small island in New York Harbor. Many Americans have emigrants who started their lives in the US after entering the country through this port. If your ancestor emigrated during this period from the UK, Europe, Scandinavia etc., there is a good chance that they came through this port (although, if your family is like many, some came through NY, some through Philadelphia, some through Boston, etc!)

Castle Garden

http://www.castlegarden.org

This free site offers access to an extraordinary database of information on 11 million immigrants from 1820 through 1892, the year Ellis Island opened. Over 100 million Americans can trace their ancestors to this early immigration period.

Joe Beine's websites

If you are doing emigration/naturalization and not checking out the websites created by Joe Beine, you are probably missing something! Quickly go to "What Passenger Lists are Online?", http://www.germanroots.com/onlinelists.html, and "Online Searchable Naturalization Indexes & Records", http://www.germanroots.com/naturalization.html, to see what is available online and what is not.

ISTG (Immigrant Ships Transcribers Guild) http://www.immigrantships.net/

Volunteers have transcribed over 11,000 Passenger Manifests. You can search what ISTG has transcribed or you can browse each volume (there are 14 as of this newsletter going to print) where the ships are listed by date, name, port of departure, port of arrival and surname (especially helpful with those spelling variant issues). This site is great if you are seeking passengers who arrived in the 17th- and 18th-centuries and it has pretty extensive holdings for the 19th-century and later.

NYC Naturalization Database—Volunteer Efforts By The Italian Genealogical Group

This website has put a great collection of naturalization record indexes for Naturalizations recorded in the Eastern District (consisting of Kings, Richmond, Queens, Nassau and Suffolk Counties), Southern District (consisting of Manhattan, Bronx and Westchester Counties), as well as the Nassau and Suffolk county and Bronx and Queen Borough Supreme Courts. The collection is expanding to include other New York state naturalization records.

This is a very good source to consultant before you start any project. With new materials constantly available online and in print, it's hard to keep up. How to Transfer Your Data from PAF and Other Programs to a New Program

A newsletter reader obviously read the recent article of Personal Ancestral File (PAF) Is Discontinued at http://blog.eogn.com/eastmans_online_genealogy/2013/06/personal-ancestral-file-paf-is-discontinued.html and was worried about transferring her data to a new program. She wrote:

Do any of the new programs allow me to transfer my data direct from PAF or do I have to type all the data I already have to a new program?

I thought I would answer here in the newsletter in case anyone else has the same question.

In short, you do not have to re-type all your data on the keyboard. All of today's genealogy programs allow for direct import of data from any of today's other programs. They all use GEDCOM files. All of today's genealogy programs support GEDCOM.

GEDCOM does have some drawbacks, as explained in that article. However, it is still much, much better than re-typing everything again, as we all used to do back in the 1980s.
