



### MY FAVORITE ANCESTOR OR THE BLACK SHEEP IN MY FAMILY

#### Our first contributor, Jerry Porter-THANKS

One of my most interesting ancestors is HANNAH EMERSON DUSTON, my ancestor ten generations removed, a famous and remarkable New England woman whose experiences and exploits are chronicled in colonial history.

She was born to Michael Emerson and Hannah Webster, 23 December 1657. Hannah Emerson married Thomas Dunston, 3 December 1677. On 15 MNarch 1697, six days after the birth of Thomas and Hannah's ninth child, a band of Indians swooped down on Haverhill, Massachusetts, where the family lived. On learning of the Indians' approach, Thomas rushed home. But Hannah was far too weak to leave. She insisted that he take the rest of the children away, which he did. Hannah, her newborn infant, and Mrs. Neff, her nurse, we captured and driven into the wilderness where the infant was killed. Some time after their capture, Hannah, Mrs. Neff, and a boy named Samuel Lennerson, captured a gun and a tomahawk from their captors and killed and scalped the ten (drunken) Indians who were "guarding" them. The group then made their way back to Haverhill, arriving there on 25 April 1697. Eventually the General Court of Massachusetts Bay paid Thomas Duston fifty pounds for Hannah's bravery (a "bounty" of sorts for the Indian scalps). "Hannah's name became a thrilling word in all the colonies" There was a phrase, "Remember Hannah Duston," the equivalent of "Remember the Alamo" or "Remember Pearl Harbor". There is a statue of Hannah in Haverhill with her arm outstretched holding a hatchet (observed by the author). It is said that Native Americans frequently steal the hatchet and spray paint on the statue. There is a smaller statue up the Merrimack River in New Hampshire at the site where the killing and scalping occurred.

Anton Musich, Richard Pohl, Stanley Novak and Thorvald Erickson were continued till next term. Richard Pohl, August Fred Schultz and Henry Davis were dismissed.

### **GENEALOGY QUIZ**

Here are the answers to the quiz in the last newsletter from www.witsend.org

- 1. 1900 The siblings were not born in 1880 and had probably left home by 1920. The 1890 census was 99% destroyed by fire. Learning what is available on each census is a basic bit of knowledge for genealogists.
- 2. <u>International Genealogical Index</u> The IGI is the world's largest genealogical database with births and marriages for over 300 million people worldwide and is derived from primary sources. It is available free of charge at any LDS Family History Center, such as the new one located at the Mormon Church in Marshfield.
- 3. <u>Grandma\_and the rest of your older relatives is where you start.</u> Ask questions while you can.
- 4. <u>Determine where the town is located and how boundaries have changed over time.</u> This is true whether you are searching in Wisconsin or Germany. As "The Music Man" said, "you have to know the territory."
- 5. <u>Died without a will.</u> Learn the terms used in genealogy. Find a book at the library or a site on the Internet that discusses the basics of genealogy.
- 6. <u>First cousin once removed</u> Be sure you know relationships. You'll want to know all about the branches on your family tree. Rootsweb has charts that help determine relationships. If you want, a chart can be published in a later edition of this newsletter, let me know.

blank. Other name and place conventions are: Do not use titles such as Dr., Mrs., Captain, Deacon, III, Esq. They are not part of the person's name. Write US places as city, county, state. Never leave out the name of the country even if it is the US. Do not use postal abbreviations for the states.

- 9. 1-2-3-4 The baptismal record, recorded at the time of the event should be most reliable. Consider when the information was given and who gave the information. Remember that if it had been the 1840 census only the name of the head of household would have been given. Information on a death record is given by someone who was not present at the birth thus the information is second-hand. Information in a family history book should be considered as clues unless there is documentation of the event. The same is true of information from the Internet
- 10. <u>False</u> Surnames were used long before they were commonly recorded. You will probably not be able to trace back to when surnames were first used. There are some exceptions, such as the Dutch in early America. Before this century spelling was not important. Most people could not write and foreign names often were mangled. Don't say "Our Elliotts <u>always</u> spelled it with 2 l's and 2 t's." You may be missing many relatives.
