PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Members of MAGG,

There was no meeting in August, as you know, so we last met in July. At that meeting I reminded you of the importance of interviewing the elderly. They have so much family history and often they are ready to flesh out the dates that we have with their enlightening anecdotes.

On August 16, I visited friends in Dubuque, Iowa. I then dropped in on a 98 year old second cousin. She had a brother die as a hero at Pearl Harbor as he helped 12 sailors wriggle through a porthole on the "Oklahoma" before it went down. She said, "No one asks about him anymore." She had his picture on a chest of drawers in his Navy whites. So I knew she wanted to talk about him. I went home and told my 88 year mother. She said, "When his mother died in 1932, they asked me to come and clean the house so his mother could be waked in the home. I also helped Mrs. Greteman make home made noodles for the funeral dinner." So here is my mother as a young single girl helping my dad's cousin's family. It was one of the many ways that my parents got to know each other. But more importantly, it shows that many great family stories are a close as our mothers. We don't have to travel far, many times, to get family history. Just ask!

I hope to see you Thursday at the monthly meeting, September 28.

MADE NINETY FOUR NEW CITIZENS MONDAY

Out of the 108 applications for naturalization passed upon at the opening of circuit court at Grand Rapids Monday, ninety-four were admitted, five were continued, eight were denied and one was held open. (from Marshfield Herald, Saturday, March 7, 1914, Pg. 1, Col. 6.)
